There will be a book prize for the two best entries in each year level.

WE WANT OUR PARENTS/CAREGIVERS/GUARDIANS TO TELL US WHAT THEY THINK: Our school is conducting a survey to find out what parents/caregivers/guardians think of our school. The Parent/Caregiver/Guardian Opinion Survey is an annual survey offered by the Department of Education and Training that is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of families' perceptions of school climate, student behaviour, and student engagement. Our school will use the survey results to help inform and direct future school planning and improvement strategies.

A random sample of 330 parents/caregivers/guardians have been selected to participate in this year's survey. The Parent/Caregiver/Guardian Opinion Survey will be conducted from today until **Friday 16th September.** The survey will be conducted **online**, only takes **20 minutes** to complete, and can be accessed at any convenient time within the fieldwork period on desktop computers, laptops, tablets or smart phones. The online survey will be available in a range of languages other than English. These include: Arabic, Vietnamese, Simplified Chinese, Chin (Hakha), Hindi, Japanese, Somali, Turkish, Punjabi and Greek.

What are the students currently learning?

Prep: Investigation Unit - Author Study – Pamela Allen

Students will learn...about Pamela Allen and her work. They will learn how to respond to the books written by Pamela Allen, focusing on the themes and characters. They will learn about the author's life and how it impacts on her work.

Grade 1: Investigation Unit – Stories and Poems of Heroes and Villains

Student will learn... about heroes in stories and poems about how they demonstrate the characteristics of bravery, honesty, capability, caring and confidence. They will learn about villains and how they demonstrate the opposite characteristics of cunning, dishonesty, uncaring, insecurity, cowardice. Students will explore the actions of heroes and villains and why they are considered right or wrong. Students will learn how to describe heroes and villains using adjectives in basic noun groups.

Grade 2: Investigation Unit – What a Pair!

Student will learn... that pairing non-fiction and fiction texts on the same appealing topic will help to build their background knowledge, improve their comprehension and increase their motivation to read.

Grade 3: Investigation Unit – Spinning Out

Student will learn... about the Earth, the Moon and the Sun. They will learn about the relative sizes and movements of these 'heavenly bodies'. Students will learn about the rotation and revolution of the Earth. They will investigate sundials and how they work.

Grade 4: Investigation Unit – Author Study - CS Lewis

Student will learn... about Clive Staples Lewis' background and the inspiration for his books. They will learn that there are a range of themes such as friendship and love that underlie the stories in books and how to identify them. Students will be reading from the Narnia Series especially The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe.

Grade 5: Investigation Unit – The Australian Colonies

Student will learn... about the establishment of the Australian Colonies following the First Fleet and culminating in Federation. They will compile a timeline showing the key stages in the development of the colonies.

Grade 6: Investigation Unit – Author Study – Margaret Wild

Student will learn... about Margaret Wild's background and the inspiration for her books. They will learn that there are a range of themes such as friendship and love that underlie the stories in books and how to identify them. They will also learn of Margaret Wild's style of writing.

Mental Health and Wellbeing-Emotions


Following up from last week there is a quiz for your family. Here are 6 emotions. See if you can guess which is which without there being very much detail in the faces.

Helping your family stay safe online

Children can learn, explore, play and make friends online. But there can be risks.

Your child might accidentally see upsetting content, be contacted by strangers or experience bullying. They might also miss out on important things like spending time outside.

Here are some easy things you can do to help keep children safe online.

Talk about online safety as a family

Let your child know they can always come to you if something happens online that makes them feel scared or upset.

You can ask your child to show you the games and apps they use. Use eSafety's <u>conversation</u> <u>starters</u> to help you get started.

Set up family rules together

As a family, you can choose some easy rules to help keep everyone safe online. You can include things like where devices can be used, what games and apps your children can use, and how much time can be spent online. Most devices and apps have features to set limits on how they are used. Watch <u>this video</u> to learn more about parental controls and settings.

Know where to get help

If you need help with an online issue and you are not sure what to do, talk about it with someone you trust, like a friend or a teacher at your child's school. You can also speak to someone at <u>Parentline</u> for help with parenting challenges. The eSafety Commissioner (eSafety) helps to keep all Australian families safe online.
